

# The Epiphany of the Lord

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#### What is an active parishioner?

An active parishioner is a person who participates in the life of the Church. This means to follow the teachings of Jesus Christ and share in Christ's role as priest, prophet and King. We are called to lead others to faith by our good example, through loving service to others, and offering our prayers, works and activities to God.

- An active parishioner is a person who has received or is preparing to receive the sacraments of Baptism and Confirmation.
- An active parishioner is a person who attends Mass regularly at St. William the Abbot and actively supports the sacramental programs for Penance, Eucharist and Confirmation. Parents who want a Catholic Faith Formation & Education for their children will see to it that their family attends Mass faithfully EVERY Sunday.
- An active parishioner gives of themselves by donating TIME, TALENT and TREASURE to the ministries of the parish and or to the volunteer organizations that support the parish. We are to share in the responsibilities that keep our Parish alive in a vibrant way.
- An active parishioner is a good financial steward of the church. As a parishioner, it is important to understand that giving financially to support the parish is a vital and key component to active parishioner status.

#### Why you need to be an active parishioner

Parishioners seeking to be godparents or sponsors for the Sacraments of Baptism and Confirmation, or those wishing to be joined in Holy Matrimony must first be verified as "active members" of the parish.

#### An active member:

- 1) Is properly registered with the parish
- 2) Faithfully attends Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation
- 3) Participates in parish activities/ministries whenever possible.
- 4) Consistently uses the parish envelope system or the electronic giving program to support the parish.

The Epiphany of the Lord January 7

The feast of the Epiphany, celebrated on January 7th, this year, is one of the oldest in the Church and one of the greatest in the ecclesiastical year. The word Epiphany is a Greek word which signifies a manifestation or revelation. During the first three centuries the manifestation of Christ to the chosen people, and His manifestation as the Savior of all races and nations, were celebrated on the same day, but since the 4th century, December 25th has been the feast of the Nativity, or Christmas, and January 7th the feast of the Epiphany, or the feast of the

Three Wise Men. It is so-called because the Gospel of the day tells us that Magi came from the East to the Jerusalem saying: "Where is the newborn King of the Jews? We saw His star at its rising and have come to pay Him homage."

They may have come from Arabia, Chaldea or Persia. Tradition says that there were three, Gaspar, Melchior, and Balthasar. The prophecy that "a star shall rise out of Jacob," and the teaching of the prophet Daniel at Babylon had spread throughout the East. When the mysterious star appeared, learned men recognized it as a sign that the coming of the Messiah was at hand and that He would be born in Judea. On entering the house, they found the child with Mary, His Mother. They prostrated themselves and did Him homage. Then they opened their coffers and presented Him with gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh.



### **Mysteries of Christmas and the Epiphany**

- In the mysteries of Christmas and Epiphany, we celebrate with wonder the truth that is Christ, God is Emmanuel with us. You are our light and our helper.
- For those who feel alone in a world too large for them, may they know the sheltering presence of your love.
- For those who feel bewildered amid the storms that overtake them, may they know the safety that You give.
- For those who feel afraid as death approaches, may they find their courage in Your Light.



Maximilian Kolbe was born in Poland on January 8, 1894. His father fought for Poland's independence from Russia, and was hanged as a traitor in 1914. After her husband's death, Maximilian's mother became a Benedictine nun. In 1910, Kolbe entered the Franciscan Order, and eight years later was ordained a priest. In 1931, he went to Japan and founded a monastery in Nagasaki, and then another in India. He returned to Poland in 1936 because of ill health.

Two years after the 1939 Nazi invasion of Poland, Fr. Kolbe was arrested for helping to house Jewish refugees and for publishing anti-Nazi materials. He was sent to Auschwitz. Several months later, a prisoner escaped from Auschwitz. It was the Nazi practice there to execute 10 men for each escaped prisoner. When the 10 were chosen, one pleaded for mercy, saying that he was a married man with young children.

On hearing this, Fr. Kolbe stepped forward and offered to take his place. The camp guard accepted his offer.

Fr. Kolbe's execution was to be slow and painful—confinement in a starvation bunker. When, after three weeks, he was still alive, he was given a fatal injection.

Maximilian Kolbe was canonized by Pope John Paul II in 1982. His feast day is August 14th.



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#### Cursillo Corner


